his event was played at RAAF Darwin Golf Club, where we are always made welcome. A beautiful Darwin August afternoon with ideal conditions and the course in good repair.

The day has it origins in the NTBA Quixotic Challenge, which according to the blurb on the big [really big!] trophy, was first competed for on 2 June 2000 at Darwin Golf Club. It was described as a 9 hole Ambrose teams Event. Ian Morris was, of course, the driving force behind the introduction of it as an annual event.

The trophy bears a badge that it was renamed The lan Morris Memorial Golf Day in 2009. Traditionally the trophy has gone to the team with the best nett score on the day. That is, the gross score, less the total of the roll of the big, fat dice.

A further trophy was added in 2007 which is smaller but much prized by the serious golfer; those who think they can hit it around a bit! This is the Law Society Northern Territory trophy for the best gross score. It also bears a badge that signifies it is to be competed for as part of The Ian Morris Memorial Golf Day. Both trophies have been won by assorted legal luminaries and their pals. The Justice Jocks won both trophies in 2007 and 2008. That should not be allowed, by legal edict, in future years. To spread the honours, the team should win one or the other, not both!

Having spent time describing the trophies, it has to be confessed that neither was present on the day, let alone presented. The sleuths are out looking for them as you read this. Anyone with information leading to the location of these items will be appropriately rewarded!

















- Suzie Simmons from the Law Society who also greeted players, photographed and attended to a myriad of duties from 1 PM to 6 PM [well beyond the call of duty].
